Craft Project: Craft Stick 3 Pigs and Wolf

You will find in the bag:

- 3 Jumbo Craft Sticks
- 9 Regular Craft Sticks
- 4 sets of googly eyes
- 1 gray or brown piece of construction paper
- 1 small black piece of construction paper
- 3 pieces of pink construction paper
- Need from home:
 - Glue or glue stick
 - scissors
 - crayons or markers

Directions:

Color the 3 jumbo craft sticks gray or brown to match the construction paper.

Form a triangle of equal sides and glue each of the 3 ends and let dry.

Color the 9 regular craft sticks pink.

Form 3 triangles with equal sides and glue each same as above and let dry.

Using the brown or gray paper, cut a triangular shape to fit behind the large triangle. (I traced the triangle and cut inside the lines). Keep the leftover scraps for the ears.

Glue the triangular shape onto the back of the large triangle and let dry. This is your wolf.

Repeat the process as above with each piece of pink paper. (I recommend you place each triangle to the paper to make sure the shape will fit and leave enough scraps for the ears and nose).

Turn the large triangle upside down so a long edge is on the top and the point is down. Take the extra brown or gray paper and cut a triangle shape for the wolf's ears and place ears behind the top stick.

Glue the large googly eyes below the top stick.

Take the black piece of construction paper to make a nose and glue on the bottom point. (I placed all parts on the triangle to get the look I wanted before gluing).

Keep the point at the top of 3 smaller triangles. Make small triangular ears and glue at the top of each side. (I switched the pink for the ears and nose to make them stand out from the head)

Make an oblong shape for the snout of each pig with the leftover pink pieces and glue onto the bottom

Match googly eyes to keep same size for each pig and glue onto the paper below the head.

You now have 3 little pigs and a big wolf to act out a story of The Three Little Pigs.

Math/Science Activity: STEM

The 3 Little Pigs Challenge

You will need:

- A box of Dots Candy (Wal-Mart and Dollar Tree sell them)
- Box of toothpicks (Need to have points on both sides)
- Blow dryer or electric fan
- One of your pigs you made above (you can use a toy or make a drawing and tape it down)

Directions

Take 12 of the dots and as many toothpicks as you need.

Design a house for your pig by sticking a toothpick into a “Dot” then repeat connecting the toothpicks with the “Dots” until you have a house to cover your pig.

Use the big, bad blow dryer (or fan) and see if your house stands.

Optional: You can print a wolf mask off of Pinterest and place the end of blow dryer through the wolf’s mouth.

Game: Huffing and Puffing

You will need:

- House and pig from above
- Empty toilet tissue roll

How to play:

Children will pretend to be the big bad wolf. Blow into the roll to try and knock over the house. Keep track of how many times it takes to blow the house down. Whoever’s house stands the longest wins.
